NEWBERRY COUNTY COUNCIL WORK SESSION MINUTES October 7, 2024

Newberry County Council met on Wednesday, October 7, 2024, at 5:02 p.m. in Council Chambers at the Courthouse Annex, 1309 College Street, Newberry, SC, for a Work Session.

Notice of the meeting was duly advertised, as required by law.

Mr. Johnson called the meeting to order at 5:02 p.m.

NEWBERRY COUNTY COUNCIL WORK SESSION
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- 1. Discussion and consideration of the purchase of a fire tanker truck for Bush River Fire Department.
 - Mr. Shacker said there was an accident over the summer and a tanker was lost. Mr. Long said the price for the new tanker came in at \$565,106, from Spartan Fire and Emergency Apparatus.
 - Mr. Long said they received insurance payments on the wrecked tanker in the amount of \$170,800 and \$24,885 for the equipment. He said the difference comes out to \$369,424.
 - Mr. Long said they have money in the budget to buy a new ambulance this year, but it won't be delivered until next year and after looking at the budget with Mr. Shacker, there are funds to cover the truck. He said they hope to have the new tanker delivered by February.
 - Mr. Johnson asked if this is to replace the tanker lost in the accident a few months prior. Mr. Long said that is correct.
 - Mr. Long said he got a comparative bid, but it was about \$20,000 more than the bid presented to council.
 - Mr. Johnson asked if this was a new truck or a used truck. Mr.
 Long said this is a brand-new truck and is a pumper tanker and
 has a bigger pump than the previous truck, and that will
 benefit the county on ISO.
 - Mr. Johnson asked Mr. Shacker how the non-appropriation clause affects the determination they buy the ambulance next year. Mr. Shacker said they would have the option to not appropriate.
 - Mr. Shacker then showed a spreadsheet showing the purchase of the tanker and ambulance. Mr. Shacker said what is not in the budget this year (on the revenue side), are the insurance claims from the tanker that was totaled and the sale of property on SC 121, which resulted in \$229,800. They also made the change where they are diverting FILOT revenue to capital items. All of this combined gives a total revenue of a little over a million dollars.

- After the cost of the new tanker, the county will be left with a balance of \$449,973.
- Mr. Long said what they were asking for tonight was to get the purchase order for the tanker and the ambulance.
- 2. Discussion and consideration of the purchase of an ambulance for EMS.
 - Mr. Shacker said they need to start looking at purchasing an ambulance every year.
 - Mr. Long said they would be looking at getting the new ambulance delivered in July and the price came in at \$437,232.
 - Mr. Long said they would like to lock in two ambulances and the other would come in the November timeframe, but he thinks they can lock in the same price for both.
 - Mr. Johnson asked for the turnaround time on ambulances. Mr. Long said they are promising this ambulance by July so they will probably start working on it in November.
 - Mr. Long said most of their ambulances have over 100,000 miles.
 - Mr. Sease asked if they defer getting the ambulance until next fiscal year, will they have the same price or will it increase. Mr. Shacker said what they are asking is the county commit to the ambulance purchase now, and they would take delivery during the next fiscal year. He said ideally, it would be nice to lock in two ambulances now at today's price.
 - Mr. Johnson said usually if they get \$100,000 for a truck, they aren't going to be able to turn around and buy another half million dollar truck off of insurance. He added he doesn't have a problem doing the truck and the two ambulances, but he would like to wait until the next meeting. He said he does not want to spend that much money of the taxpayers' money without having it on the agenda and the residents to have the opportunity to come and speak.
 - Mr. Fulmer added he would prefer to do it when the other council members are present, as well.

- Mr. Fulmer asked if that would be enough time. Mr. Long said he only hopes they will not get sold prior to the next meeting.
- The purchase of the tanker and the two ambulances will be presented to council during the October 16, 2024, meeting.
- 3. Update on the status of Newberry County following Hurricane Helene and on Newberry County's storm recovery efforts.
 - Mr. Shacker echoed the words of council and acknowledged the exceptional job everyone did responding to this event. Mr. Shacker quoted Mr. Long as saying that he has not encountered an event like this where it was countywide. Mr. Shacker said there is nothing like being on a team and he was impressed with Mr. Long, Mr. Wicker, the Newberry County Sheriff's Office, Newberry County Public Works and then what the Newberry County Assessor's Office is doing with damage assessment. He then recognized Newberry County Administration giving out water and staffing the offices when they were short-handed. He mentioned the Newberry County Auditor and Treasurer Office working through internet issues, Mr. Nieto resolving the issues. GIS being critical. He said everyone contributed and he was so impressed and proud to be part of it.
 - Mr. Long said he worked in the grocery business for 24 years and he dealt with the aftermath of disasters, including people going crazy wanting milk, bread and eggs. However, what he witnessed in the dispatch room at 5 a.m. on September 27, 2024, will forever be sketched in his head. He said it was the most organized chaos he has ever witnessed, and everyone in that room did everything in their power to make sure all residents were safe. He said once he saw what was going on, he went into EOC to immediately activate everyone to ensure the safety of residents. He said they started getting the PODs (Points of Distribution) set up to provide supplies to the community. Mr. Long said they had county staff, city staff, volunteers from all over, the S.C. National Guard and they don't

- know how valuable it was for everyone to come out without begin asked.
- Mr. Long said they were able to set up FEMA disaster assistance for that day (October 7) and in the coming weeks they will have a DRC (Disaster Recovery Center) at the Newberry County Sheriff's Office, as well.
- Mr. Long said they also need to recognize the utility workers, water and sewer; all of them went above and beyond the call of duty. He said even the fuel companies brought fuel to the EOC, as did the Newberry County School District. He said all the support from the county was tremendous.
- Sheriff Foster said at the beginning, the dispatchers who he said are the lowest paid public safety employees on the county payroll – did a stellar job. He said it started at about 2 a.m. then got worse at 5 a.m. He said council would not believe the number of calls that came in, calls ranging from trees being down, power lines being down, etc. He said dispatch handled the situation with grace and dignity. Sheriff Foster said Chief Deputy Wesley Boland, who handles NCSO communications, designed the county's communications system and the county never lost that, and the county helped other counties get their communications back up. Sheriff Foster said Mr. Boland opened up the backup EOC (located at the Newberry County Detention Cetner) and found out when they wired the generator for that section, the backup center wasn't completely done, meaning they were on battery backup. However, Mr. Boland and John Curley were able to get power to get a second set of dispatchers out there.
- Sheriff Foster said the total 911 calls during that period were 631, less than 100 seconds was the duration of most calls, calls were answered within 40 seconds. On the 803-321-2222 number, they answered 435 calls, doing so in the same amount of time. Dispatch made 364 outbound calls. Sheriff Foster said dispatchers rarely get complimented and he wanted to do so.

- He added several of the dispatchers had to drive through the storm to get there.
- Sheriff Foster mentioned a story of getting help to a gentleman with a head injury and they sent deputies out, and with the help of others, were able to clear a path to get the man to the hospital.
- Sheriff Foster, in talking to their counterparts across the state, said Newberry County did better clearing roads and getting help. He also said in setting up the PODs, the NCSO staffed most of those locations, along with the S.C. National Guard at some places, and that they Newberry County Administration staff came and passed out water, and college and high school students showed up to help as well. At those PODs, 10,080 cases of water were distributed, and 2,064 Meals-Ready-to-Eat cases were distributed. They then took supplies to locations where the heavy damage occurred, like Chappells and Silverstreet.
- Sheriff Foster added that it was hectic, and they were trying to answer calls, answer people, and while they were out there working, people fed staff several times, restaurants from Columbia, Newberry, Prosperity, fed them to make sure they could keep going. He said every first responder left their houses, their families, to come and help others and it says a lot about the employees of Newberry County.
 - Mr. Johnson added that he saw deputies helping to keep lineman safe as they worked to get the power back up.
- Sheriff Foster added that they had a lot of residents arrive with their equipment to help clear fallen trees and it was a great effort by a lot of people.
- Mr. Rowe said as far as county-maintained roads, they had roughly 150 roads blocked and within two to three days, they had that number cut in half. He said that speaks volumes. He said during the course of this storm, Newberry County Public Works (made up of 12 people) cut 413 trees that were blocking roads. He said they had several roads with excess of 30 trees

on them, and two that had 60 trees on them. On average, there were 108 hours worked and to date, there are 5-10 roads that are still partially blocked.

- Mr. Johnson thanked Mr. Rowe and said, "an excellent job by all of their team."
- Ms. McDonald presented a PowerPoint (included with these minutes) regarding damage assessment. She said three businesses were impacted by the storm and 137 residences. She added that they have \$8.8 million in estimated damages.
- Mr. Kelly showed a dashboard from data taken from the Palmetto Portal to look at county-wide totals, showing data relative to the storm.
- Mr. Shacker once again complimented everyone for the hard work they put in, including communication. Mr. Shacker said the company the county contracts with for debris maintenance had to de-mobilize, but the county will be able to work with SCDOT to get debris removed from local roads.
- Mr. Sease asked if the county is planning on doing a postcritique to see what they did well, what they can improve on, etc. Sheriff Foster said Mr. Long already held one last week.
- Mr. Johnson said that he speaks for all of council when he said they commend everyone that was a part of this and Newberry County residents who helped during this. He said he thanks God for the spirit that exist in Newberry County and the people of Newberry County.
- Sheriff Foster added that you hear a lot of people say not being prepared, he said this was a once and a lifetime situation (Category 2 Hurricane this far inland). He said this may never happen in our lifetimes again. He said we had plans, like buying from local gas stations, but they were out of power, and the backup didn't work, but working together, the county was able to find an alternative.





Newberry County Council met on Wednesday, October 7, 2024, at 6:04 p.m. in Council Chambers at the Courthouse Annex, 1309 College Street, Newberry, SC, for a regular scheduled meeting.

Notice of the meeting was duly advertised, as required by law.

Mr. Johnson called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m.

Mr. Fulmer led the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

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- 1. Adoption of Consent Agenda:
 - a. Newberry County Council Work Session September 18, 2024.
 - b. Newberry County Council Meeting September 18, 2024.
 - c. Newberry County Council Emergency Meeting September 27, 2024.
 - Mr. Scurry made a motion to accept the minutes as presented; Mr. Fulmer provided the second and the motion carried 5-0.
- 2. Additions, Deletions & Adoption of the Agenda.
 - Mr. Fulmer made a motion to accept the agenda as presented; Mr. Sease provided the second and the motion carried 5-0.
- 3. Ordinance 09-01-2024. An Ordinance Approving the Terms of an Intergovernmental Agreement Between Newberry County and the Newberry County Water and Sewer Authority.
 - a. Public Hearing
 - Mr. Brent Richardson, Manager of the NCWSA, said back in 2021, they began cost estimates for their CPST project (wastewater treatment expansion at the Boinest Road facility, a half a million gallon a day expansion that is much needed to supply capacity). He said when this was originally prepared, there was not a real detailed design. When they went into the detailed design, things majorly changed, mainly due to inflation and factors found during detailed design.
 - He said they determined the existing motor control building was not going to be able to house the new

- equipment, requiring a new motor control building. They were also able to determine the number of cubic yards of fill and cut that were needed for the grading and the building of the basin and they were able to determine their electrical equipment needs.
- Mr. Richardson said he knows the cost estimate went up significantly and there was cause for concern. He said they do feel the project is crucial for the growth of Newberry County and for development of jobs in the county. He said waste treatment capacity is not something you can build once the industry is looking here in Newberry County. He said as of April of 2025, they will have been working on just their environmental permits for two years on this project.
 - Mr. Johnson said his first concern is if they are that far over now, and they haven't gotten to construction how much more over can they get and are they going to turn around and come back and why do this now when there are other projects ahead of this one.
 - o Mr. Richardson said that is why they requested this agreement and what it would say there would be no coming back to council or CPST regarding additional funds, that would be capped and the NCWSA would be 100% responsible for funding above the amount. He said they already have a million dollars in the project, as it sits today.
 - Mr. Johnson said if by some strange reason, it did not meet the projected cost and the NCWSA fell short, would they commit returning any overage. Mr. Richardson said yes and that would not be a second thought.
 - Mr. Reeder asked with the way things are developing now, are they sure they will be able

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- to handle that. Mr. Richardson said yes, they feel like they can. He said they want to make sure they can serve at the Mid-Carolina Commerce Park, when needed.
- Mr. Sease asked if they were currently at 95 million gallons a day in capacity; to which Mr. Richardson said yes and this will take it to 1.5 million gallons a day. Mr. Sease asked what the current average is; Mr. Richardson said it is currently at 350,000, but committed is right at 600,000 and they have right at 400,000 uncommitted. He said every time a permit from DHEC is issued for flow, that number gets lower. He said once you hit a certain capacity, DHEC will stop issuing construction permits and that is what they want to avoid.
- Mr. Fulmer asked about this being needed for the industrial park; Mr. Richardson said it is capacity and they are trying to improve available capacity at the plant to serve whatever the county needs. He said the industries are a focus due to the distance to the commerce park, but it would be available for residential, commercial or industrial.
- Mr. Scott Cain, a board member of the NCWSA, thanked council for their support by putting them on the penny sales tax. He said the issue they are running into is lead time and the scope of work has not changed. He said they are still waiting for DHEC as they have put in for the permits. He said they are trying to stay proactive to help the county have infrastructure ready.
- Mr. Cain said the equipment is special equipment and they have limited suppliers, and they are stuck with

the cost of inflation. He said the costs have just escalated.

 Mr. Fulmer asked if this includes any additional line installation. Mr. Richardson said no, there will be onsite piping on the plant site, and this does not include offsite piping.

b. Second Reading

- Before they had the second reading, Mr. Johnson asked Mr. Shacker to discuss the financial side of this and his anticipation of the project.
- Mr. Shacker said all of the CPST projects in the current iteration have had cost overruns. He said they have identified a little over \$9.6 million in overruns to implement the projects. He said they are recommending to council that they fund these overruns on the front end, and some of these projects are not viable without secured funding for cost overruns. He said the NCWSA project is in the middle, with projects below them, and the advantage of the agreement is that the NCWSA is waiving a claim to additional revenue beyond the \$9.6 million, positioning the projects below an enhanced stake to cost overrun funding.
- Mr. Shacker said something to consider is that this revenue is restricted, if it is not spent on these projects, it can be carried forward to a future referendum or allocated by council for eligible uses.
- Mr. Sease asked regarding the excess funding if they could use that toward other purchases, like fire trucks, ambulances; Mr. Shacker said those would not be eligible. Mr. Shacker said the excess is a little bit of insurance if the numbers are off or carried off to

- the next CPST. Mr. Johnson said that funding is for these projects only, or similar projects.
- Mr. Scurry made a motion to accept second reading;
 Mr. Reeder provided the second.
- Mr. Sease said he had some concerns and had constituents who had concerns about spending that money but were unable to attend due to Hurricane Helene recovery. He said that is a lot of money and it almost doubled compared to the others.
- Mr. Johnson requested another public hearing during third reading.
- Mr. Fulmer said he has received a lot of phone calls about concerns involving such a high increase, but based on what he is seeing on funding, it will still be funded with what was originally planned, capitalizing on high interest rates to cover it.
- Mr. Johnson said they have to do these projects right and meet residents' expectations.
- The motion carried 5-0.
- 4. County Council may take action on matters discussed during the 5 p.m. Work Session.
 - There was no action taken.
- 5. Further discussion of Newberry County's storm recovery efforts, if desired by council.
 - There was no further discussion.

 - Mr. Fulmer said the response of the residents and employees of Newberry County really should not surprise him, he said Newberry County has a closeknit strong community and that is what makes Newberry County special. He said anyone coming into the community, that is something they look for and Newberry County is a gem. He said he appreciates emergency response folks spearheading the efforts that they have made.
 - Mr. Reeder said he appreciates the help of everyone, and it takes a village, and Newberry has a strong village.
 - Mr. Sease thanked all the first responders of Newberry County, all of the utility providers, Public Works, SCDOT, and all of the volunteers that came out and it was a great joint effort by everyone.
 - Mr. Johnson said blessed beyond measure are not the words. He said thoughts are out for Mr. Shealy as he is out trying to restore power, and Mr. Hipp and his family during his wife's recovery. He also recognized first responders as they continue to serve. He said on a smaller scale, Newberry County Council as they pulled together an emergency meeting to

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approve a State of Emergency Ordinance, he said no one had power that day and for everyone to stand up and do what they did makes it fun to be on council.

WHEREAS, five of the top 10 taxpaying businesses in the county are manufacturers, supporting local government, emergency response and local schools.

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE TERMS OF AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN NEWBERRY COUNTY AND NEWBERRY COUNTY WATER AND SEWER AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, Newberry County, South Carolina (the "County"), following a successful referendum held on November 3, 1998, imposed a Capital Project Sales Tax ("CPST") within the County pursuant to the provisions of S.C. Code Ann. §4-10-300 *et seq.* (1976, as amended); and

WHEREAS, the CPST has been reimposed from time to time in the County following referendums successfully held in 2004, 2010, 2016, and 2022; and

WHEREAS, since its original imposition in the County, and continuing through the renewals thereof, the CPST has provided to both the County and the political subdivisions within the County funds to defray the cost of various capital improvements, thus avoiding the imposition of additional property taxes in the County and mitigating the need for increases in rates of public utilities in the County; and

WHEREAS, the Newberry County Water and Sewer Authority, a political subdivision and special purpose district of the State of South Carolina (the "Authority") has been a beneficiary of the CPST in each iteration of its imposition; and

WHEREAS, in the most recent referendum for reimposition of the CPST, which was held on November 8, 2022 (the "2022 Referendum"), the capital projects approved therein (the "2022 Projects") consist of 12 items with an aggregate cost, as shown on the 2022 Referendum ballot, of \$37,047,130; and

WHEREAS, the Council is advised that, as a consequence of inflation, the total estimated cost of all 2022 Projects has increased by \$8,881,687 since the 2022 Referendum, from \$37,047,130 to not less than \$45,928,817; and

WHEREAS, the 2022 Referendum ballot included the upgrade and expansion of the Authority's Cannon's Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant (the "WWTP") at a cost of \$5,154,560; and

WHEREAS, the Council is advised by the Authority that estimated cost of the WWTP has increased by \$4,462,231 since the 2022 Referendum to \$9,616,791; and

WHEREAS, the County intends to proceed with the issuance of not exceeding \$35,250,000 general obligation bonds, as approved in the 2022 Referendum (the "CPST Bonds") to defray a portion of the costs of the 2022 Projects; and

WHEREAS, the projected cost overrun on the WWTP shown above amounts to more than 50% of total projected overruns on the 2022 Projects; and

WHEREAS, if the actual cost overrun on the WWTP exceeds the present estimate thereof, the WWTP and other 2022 Projects may face delays and funding shortfalls; and

WHEREAS, the Authority desires to assist the County with its efforts to proceed with the issuance of the CPST Bonds and to facilitate the same such that construction of all 2022 Projects may be initiated, completed and their intended benefits made available to the citizens of the County; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has, by resolution duly adopted (the "NCWSA Resolution"), determined that it will have no further need of cost overrun funding beyond that described above, and that it is committed to providing additional funding required for the WWTP, if any, from available funds of the Authority and from the proceeds of waterworks and sewer system revenue bonds of the Authority, which it may issue on its motion and which it has a capacity to undertake within the constraints of its existing loan documents, and provided the County Administrator of the County with a copy of such resolution, attached hereto as Exhibit A;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the County Council of the County of Newberry, in Council duly assembled this 16th day of October 2024 that: Council hereby approves the terms of the NCWSA Resolution and agrees that such terms, hereby approved by this Ordinance, constitute an Intergovernmental Agreement between the County and the Authority.
